  A more popular treatment of the same subject.

  Contains useful chapters on "Houses in the 18th Century", "Architects and Sculptors of the 18th Century" and "Robert Adam to the Regency".
- GOODHART-RENDEL, H. S. The Age of Taste. The Regency Society of Brighton and Hove: 1948. 1s.

A witty appraisal of the architecture of an age in which "Classic and Romantic were neither opposed nor reconciled but peacefully co-existent".

†Hussey, Christopher. \*The Picturesque: Studies in a Point of View. Putnam: 1927.

By far the best study of the "picturesque" element in Georgian architecture and landscaping.

LANCASTER, OSBERT. \*Pillar to Post: The Pocket Lamp of Architecture. Murray: 1938. 6s.

A semi-humorous account of architectural development in England, illustrated in the author's characteristic manner.

- PILCHER, DONALD. \*The Regency Style. Batsford: 1947. 18s.

  A scholarly analysis of the diverse elements which went to make up the "Regency" style, together with a survey of the wide range of buildings to which it gave rise.
- Reilly, Paul. \*Regency Architecture. Art and Technics: 1948. 10s. 6d.

A comprehensive treatment of the subject, with notes on the fourteen principal architects of the period.

- †RICHARDSON, A. E. \*Georgian England: A Survey of Social Life, Trades, Industries and Art from 1700-1820. Batsford: 1931.

  A full description of the background to life in Georgian times by an acknowledged authority on the period.
- RICHARDSON, A. E., and CORFIATO, HECTOR O. \*The Art of Architecture. English Universities Press: 1938. 42s. 6d.

  Contains chapters on the Georgian period which are valuable as an introduction to the subject.
- Scott, Geoffrey. The Architecture of Humanism: A Study in the History of Taste. Constable: (2nd ed.) 1924. 10s. 6d.

  An attack on the romantic and other fallacies in architectural criticism.
- SITWELL, SACHEVERELL. \*British Architects and Craftsmen. Batsford: (3rd ed.) 1946-7. 21s.

A book which relates the work of British architects and craftsmen (including clock-makers and silversmiths) to the general European background and tradition—a theme which the distinguished author handles with elegant mastery.

STEEGMAN, JOHN. The Rule of Taste from George I to George IV. Macmillan: 1936. 5s.

This only deals incidentally with architecture but is valuable as showing the contemporary attitude to the art.

A clear and well-written appreciation.
